# Geàrr-iomradh | Overview

Bun is Bàrr | Root and Branch is a mentoring program managed by the Office of Gaelic Affairs, which provides Gaelic-speakers in Nova Scotia with the opportunity to work with Gaelic mentors and elders as they develop their language and cultural skills. The goal of Bun is Bàrr is to help create a new generation of Gaelic tradition bearers: those who are knowledgeable of, and steeped in, Nova Scotia's Gaelic tradition. Bun is Bàrr seeks to achieve three objectives:

- Continued transmission of Gaelic language through culture
- Re-integration of Nova Scotia Gaelic expression, such as song, music, story, tradition, custom, and dance into the social life of Gaels
- Restore collective Gaelic memory and identity

Bun is Bàrr was established in 2009 by the late Seumas Watson, Highland Village, and Frances MacEachen, formerly with Gaelic Affairs. Inspired by social learning theory, Gàidhlig aig Baile, and Dr. Leanne Hinton's work on California Indigenous Language mentorship programs that began in the 1990s, *Bun is Bàrr* aimed to give adults the o ghlùin gu glùin | knee to knee experience that would be had in a Gaelic home – everyday activities, visiting, and seanchas (stories, songs, genealogies, traditions, histories, etc).

Over the years, various spinoffs of Bun is Bàrr have been offered to target intermediate learners as well.

There will be three opportunities for participation in Bun is Barr mentorship opportunities.

- 1. Bun is Bàrr: Muime/Oide 's Tàilleabhach | Mentor & Apprentice
- 2. Bun is Bàrr: An Drochaid Eadarainn | Gaelic Transcription Program
- 3. Caidreabh an t-Seanchais | Seanchas Fellowship

# 1. Bun is Bàrr: Muime/Oide 's Tàilleabhach | Mentor & Apprentice

We will continue to have one-on-one mentorship with Nova Scotian Gaelic speakers, aig a bheil Gàidhlig o 'n ghlùin | who grew up with Gaelic, in this component of the program. A small number of apprentices will be selected and paired with mentors who they will visit regularly throughout the winter/spring of 2025. Apprentices will spend 50 (or more) hours with their mentors over a three-month period.

Apprentices at this level of the program must be fluent Gaelic speakers and will have an oral Gaelic interview as part of the selection process. Due to the limited number of places available, not everyone who applies will be accepted into this part of the program.

Apprentices must have access to reliable transportation, have a strong commitment to the hours, and provide a criminal record check. Travel costs will be covered for apprentices as part of the program (up to a maximum of \$1000).

We are seeking Expressions of Interest from potential apprentices.

#### 2. <u>Bun is Bàrr: An Drochaid Eadarainn | Gaelic Transcription Program</u>

This component of the program will be a moderated program where facilitators will work with participants bi-weekly on recordings of historic Gaelic Nova Scotia naidheachdan is sgeulachdan | stories. Recordings will be assigned and reviewed during online sessions (approximately 1-1.5 hour(s) in length) and then participants will work on transcriptions of the supplied recordings on their own before the following session. The sessions will offer opportunities for questions, learning about the sgeulaichean | storytellers, discussion, and fellowship with other participants.

Transcriptions produced by the group will be added to An Drochaid Eadarainn: An Drochaid Bheò and will be available to all with an interest – speakers, learners, educators, researchers, etc.

This program will run through the winter and spring for about 3 months and would be appropriate for fluent speakers and intermediate learners. Sessions will be conducted in Gaelic.

We are seeking Expressions of Interest from potential participants/transcribers. There will be no cost to participate.

# 3. Caidreabh an t-Seanchais | Seanchas Fellowship

Finally, we will be supporting in-person Gaelic seanchas sessions several times over the winter and spring in various Nova Scotia communities. The sessions will focus on stories, songs, and traditions from the Nova Scotia corpus. They will be delivered using Gàidhlig aig Baile (GAB) methodology and be conducted entirely in Gaelic. These sessions are appropriate for intermediate learners. Fluent learners will also be welcome. The sessions will run for approximately six hours (9:30-3:30) on both a Saturday and Sunday.

We are seeking expressions of interest from mnathan/fir an taighe | hosts who would be interested in organizing, hosting, and facilitating these Caidreabh an t-Seanchais sessions. Hosts will receive \$1000/weekend to cover event costs and professional fees.

### Carson? | Why?

While the goals of the program, as listed above, have remained consistent over the years, the actual structure of *Bun is Bàrr* has evolved over the decade and a half it has run. Depending on which mentors and apprentices were in each cohort the program might look quite different from year to year.

There has also been a significant shift in demographics in Gaelic Nova Scotia during this time, and unfortunately, there are far fewer Nova Scotians whose first language (L1) is Gaelic still with us today. While we all feel the loss of each tradition bearer deeply, we also must acknowledge that there are no longer enough L1 Nova Scotian Gaelic speakers to run Bun is Bàrr the way it was run in 2009.

At the office we are very proud of this program and the hugely important work each mentor and apprentice has done in contributing to our community's linguistic and cultural renewal. We accept though that the program must continue to develop.

Beginning last year, *Daltachas | Fosterage*, a mentorship program for intermediate speakers that launched several years after Bun is Bàrr, was incorporated into Bun is Bàrr. The Daltachas branch of the program was run online, as it had been since the start of the pandemic, for a group of Gaelic learners with a single mentor, while the Bun is Bàrr branch ran like it had before with individual mentor/apprentice teams.

In assessing last year's program, including the valuable feedback we received from participants, we have decided to make some changes to this year's offerings.

The biggest factors in making these changes are the smaller number of L1 speakers available to be mentors at the Bun is Bàrr level, apprentices' time & capacity, and online fatigue for both mentors and apprentices at the Daltachas level.

We hope these challenges will be addressed by this plan for 2024/25.

# **Cinn-uidhe | Criteria for Apprentices**

- Apprentices must be Nova Scotia residents;
- Apprentices must be 18 years of age;
- Apprentices must demonstrate previous commitment to Gaelic language and cultural acquisition;
- Apprentices must have the time to devote to language and cultural learning;
- Apprentices must demonstrate a high level of independence and motivation concerning their language learning;
- Apprentices must demonstrate a strong interest in Nova Scotia's Gaelic oral tradition and cultural expression;
- Preference will be given to candidates who will be active speakers of Gaelic in their family and community or those who plan to teach Gaelic in Nova Scotia;
- Apprentices should have a recording device for the purposes of taping Gaelic sessions for playback at home and Internet access; and
- Apprentices who have already participated in previous *Daltachas* or *Bun is Bàrr* programming are eligible to apply
